Regards: 1993 Granite Mountain Open, Allotment No. 1636 Wyoming
Please let this serve as a formal demand by We The Undersigned (Permittees) to the U.S. Department of the Interior and Lander BLM Field Office: Reinstatement of AUM's to pre-1993 status; Providing Allotment Management Plan; Compensation for income loss due to AUM cuts.

History: Early 1993, Jack Kelly (Area Manager Lander BLM) ordered that cattle grazing allotment permit owners (Permittees) of the Granite Mountain Open, Allotment No. 1636 enter a joint "interim" "Rangeland Management" agreement with BLM.

BLM claimed such agreement was necessary to allegedly re-attain a certain level of range readiness.

BLM - Permittee partnership agreed said "Rangeland Management Agreement" was defined as an "interim" agreement, because it held opportunity for termination upon the meeting of verbal and written performance expectations, or non-performance by parties involved.

Mr. Kelly committed to "developing an Allotment Management Plan (AMP)" by 1994. Regardless multiple requests, BLM has failed to provide AMP.

BLM committed to bringing feral horse numbers back to and maintaining thereon the maximum number of 250. BLM withholds feral horse count information from Permittees. Although Permittees do have fly over and ground photos, and other documentation that bear out BLM's failure to meet that commitment.

BLM committed to co-partnering on water, fence and other improvements. To date, BLM has failed to activate such improvements.

In exchange for the before-mentioned commitments by BLM, Permittees agreed to take what they understood to be a "temporary" cut in AUM's.


Believing BLM would hold up their part of interim agreement in good faith, and exercise reinstatement of AUM's, Permittees signed said interim agreement and put in voluntary non-use 5662 AUM's.


Permittees have followed said AUM cuts since May of 1993.

Futhermore, Permittees have taken an additional 50% voluntary reduction in AUMs during the scientifically debatable droughts of 2001 and 2006 through 2008.


Therefore, let it be known that no later than May 2011, we demand: Termination of 1993 interim agreement. Conditions not met by BLM constitutes just cause for termination; Reinstatement of Granite Mountain AUM's to pre-1993 and/or first date of BLM/Permittee agreement; Providing of Allotment Management Plan; An independent review board, with oversight by Wyoming State Auditor/Treasurer, to review income losses due to interim agreement and accrued by each Permittee, for the purpose of determining the amount of compensation they can expect from the Department of Interior.


